Welcome to the 2026 Edinburgh Music Competition Festival

Once again I am delighted to share our Festival syllabus with you. For more than a century the Edinburgh Music Competition Festival has encouraged and inspired amateur musicians of all ages, giving them a platform to perform, and to share their music with their peers. We would love you to be part of our 2026 Festival.

We have something for everyone, competitive, and non-competitive classes for solos, duets, chamber music, ensembles, choirs and orchestras. All classes will be adjudicated by an official adjudicator. We engage specialists wherever possible so everyone can learn from their expert advice and encouraging words. In our 2025 festival we had over 900 entrants. Maybe in 2026 we can reach 1,000!

There are one or two minor changes to be noted. Firstly, check again on the age categories. The **17 and under**

classes have been changed to **18 and under and still at school.** Note the age of eligibility to enter a class is your **age as of 1st January 2026.** Be sure to enter the correct category. There are some additions and changes in other sections so please read your syllabus carefully. There are also some **NEW** classes - marked in bold. Please let us know if there is a class you would like to see included and we can consider it for next year.

I am delighted to say we are using a new entry system this year, called Play and Perform. It should make entering easier. All will be done online, including payments. When you open the online entry form you will find help with how to make your entry. Cheques will no longer be accepted. Concerto entries can also be made on this system. A huge thank you to Eun-Joo Yoon for all the work she has put into organising this change-over.

Due to the enormous popularity and success of the **Concerto** class in recent years, we are continuing to set a cap at 50 entrants. So please read the entry requirements carefully and get your entries in as soon as possible. The Festival Concerto Class, first round, will be held on **Friday 23rd and Saturday 24th January 2026.** The main Festival will begin on **Tuesday 3rd March** and end with the Highlights Concert and Concerto Final on **Sunday 15th March 2026.**

We always welcome an audience throughout our Festival so please come and enjoy a high standard of performance for free. The only charge is for our final concert which costs £15. Tickets will be available at all venues and online.

Our Festival is run entirely by our hard-working volunteers. If you have even one spare day, or part of a day, and would like to help during the festival please contact us at email@ecfest.org or if you would like to become a member there is a form available in this syllabus. We look forward to receiving your entries and to seeing you in March 2026.

Regulations 2026

PLEASE READ ALL FESTIVAL REGULATIONS CAREFULLY

1 ELIGIBILITY

This is an amateur Festival. Those musicians who receive, or have received, fees for their performances (i.e. more than out of pocket expenses), are barred from entering. Exceptions in 2026 are Classes 53, teacher and pupil duets (232, 259, 283 and 323), teacher-led Creative Performance and Traditional Music (Classes 3 and 4) and Primary Music Making (Class 402). For classes with age limits the qualifying date is 1.1. 2026. All ages may take part in Open Classes including music students in further education. Music students may not enter classes 127, 221, 255, 331, 418 or 419.

2 ENTRIES

All entries must be submitted by an adult (i.e. someone over 18), teacher, parent or guardian on behalf of a performer. Non-competitive classes are indicated as such; all other classes are competitive. Entrants may appear once only in any solo class unless on different instruments. Only one entry per competitor is permitted in **Class 1 (Concerto)**. Otherwise entrants may appear only once in a class unless with different partners. In orchestras and choirs all performers must be bona fide members of the named group. Please also note that participants may not perform the same work in more than one class. In case of doubt please enquire (email@ecfest.org). Entries can be made online by following the link on **www.ecfest.org** or, for general entries, by using the paper form in the Syllabus centre-fold. Please note that entry fees now are payable only online and are not refundable. **Late entries will not normally be accepted.**

3 CLASS LEVELS

Entrants should be entered at their **current** level of study as defined below, in both competitive and non-competitive classes. Own choice of piece(s) need not be selected from a published exam list or graded anthology, but should be at the specified Level. **Where, in the opinion of the adjudicator, an Entrant is playing a piece outside the appropriate Level, they will not be eligible to win an award.**

Level 1 is for musicians playing at Grades 1-2 standard.

Level 2 is for musicians playing at Grades 3-4 standard.

Level 3 is for musicians playing at Grades 5-6 standard.

Level 4 is for musicians playing at Grades 7-8 standard.

Musicians performing at a standard beyond Grade 8 should enter Open classes.

4 TIME LIMITS

Entrants should observe set time limits. If they overrun they may be stopped and will not be eligible to win an award. Recitals, including spoken introductions, should **fill** but not exceed the allotted time. In 2026 these are Classes 101, 102, 104; 201, 202 and 204; 271; 301, 302 and 304; 411 and 421.

5 OFFICIAL ACCOMPANISTS

The services of a Festival Accompanist will be available if required for Instrumental Classes up to Level 3 and for all Solo Junior Vocal Classes although you can use your own accompanist. Performers should send copies of the music chosen with the correct postage, and no later than 30th January, to Dr Philip Coad, 210 Craigcrook Road, Edinburgh EH4 7BA, clearly marked with Entrant's name, class number and the piece to be performed. Music which is late, illegible or in poor condition may be refused. There will be no Official Accompanists for Choirs, for any 15 minute Recital or for the following Instrumental Classes: Open, 10 minute Recital, Junior Challenge and Level 4. There will be no Official Accompanists for Open Solo Vocal Classes (Classes 411 to 419) but entrants may contact Philip Coad for advice by phone 07734 252825 or email (email@ecfest.org). Engaging an accompanist is the entrant's responsibility.

6 MUSIC FOR PERFORMERS, ACCOMPANISTS AND ADJUDICATORS

For works which are in copyright, performers and their accompanists must ensure that even when playing or singing from memory they bring published copies of works to their performance. **Copies must be supplied for the Adjudicator** at all classes.

COPYRIGHT: For works still in copyright, all participants are responsible for ensuring that neither they nor their pupils or children infringe the laws of copyright. This affects works by a living composer or one who has died within the last 70 years, or works from an edition published in the last 25 years. Additional copies for the Adjudicator should be as published except where the copyright holder is a member of the Music Publishers' Association. In such cases a photocopy may be provided. This will be destroyed by the Festival steward at the end of the class. In the case of music in the public domain, as for instance traditional tunes, musicians should check the copyright status of the arrangement. In the case of music legally downloaded from the Internet, scores must be clearly marked with the name of the site from which they have been obtained.

All copies should be clearly marked with the Entrant's name and Class details.

7 ADJUDICATION

All performers will receive a written adjudication as soon as is practicable after the end of their classes, those for competitions noting Category/ies achieved. Performance in competitive classes will be graded by the following categories:

O (Outstanding); **E** (Excellent); **G** (Good); **S** (Sound); **M** (More security needed). In all cases the Adjudicator's decision is final.

8 AWARDS

Awards will only be made where the winner has achieved Category O or Category E. Medals and trophies will normally be presented after competitions. Winners of trophies will be required to sign receipts for them.

9 PHOTOGRAPHY AND RECORDING

Photography, sound recording and video recording are prohibited during Festival performances and adjudications. Festival staff will be at liberty to ask any person not complying to leave the venue. Following performances, however, there may be an opportunity for private photographs to be taken, adhering to the instructions of the Festival stewards. Occasionally an ECFA-approved, professional photographer may be in attendance. Parents and teachers should advise a steward if they or their children/pupils do not want to be photographed.

10 CHILD AND VULNERABLE ADULT PROTECTION

It is important that teachers and parents entering children in the Festival understand that Festival staff are charged with the smooth running of events and will not act *in loco parentis*. Responsibility for the care and supervision of children – defined for this purpose as persons under 18 years of age – lies with their parents or with other adults to whom their parents have entrusted them, both while they are performing and at all other times during the Festival. Similarly, Festival staff will not take responsibility for the care and supervision of vulnerable adults who, if appropriate, should be accompanied to, and during, the Festival. Teachers have a particular responsibility to ensure that the parents of children they are entering for the Festival are aware of this policy.

Classes in the 2026 Festival will be held at St Cuthbert's Church with entry off Lothian Road or King Stables Road, St Mark's Unitarian Church on Castle Terrace, St Michael and All Saints, Brougham Street, Stockbridge Parish Church, Saxe Coburg St. and St Vincent's Chapel, St Vincent Street. In exceptional circumstances additional venues may be required.

Final Concert

The 2026 Festival Highlights concert, followed by the Final of the Concerto Class, accompanied by the Orchestra of the Friends of the Festival, conducted by William Conway, will be held on **Sunday 15 March** in St Cuthbert's Church.

Own Choice: A Concerto or movement(s) from a Concerto, with piano accompaniment, not to exceed 20 minutes (including orchestral tuttis). Official accompanists will not be provided for this class.

- This is an advanced-level competition, open to any age but strictly for amateur musicians (please see Regulation 1 – Eligibility). Not open to postgraduate music students. Previous winners may not enter.
- All entries must be submitted by an adult i.e, someone over 18, or by someone on behalf of the performer a teacher, parent or guardian.
- Applying for the concerto first round is a 2-step process. The choice of Concerto is subject to approval and only one entry is permitted per competitor. Unsuitable works, eg. requiring too large or complex an orchestra, may be refused. When applying to enter the class online, entrants will be asked to supply full details of orchestration, source of the parts, name of accompanist, and their availability for the first round on Friday 23 and Saturday 24 January. At the initial stage, you will not be charged as entries will need to be screened so the class fee initially appears as £0. After you have checked out and once your entry has been approved, your entry will be put into your basket on our online entry system at which point you will need to pay the £45 to participate in the concerto first round.
- Your choice of concerto must be approved before your entry can be completed and payment made. Therefore it is advisable to make the initial application by 16 November - at least two weeks before the closing date of 30 November 2025. Due to the popularity of this class, only the **first 50** received and approved entries will be accepted.
- At the First Round four competitors will be selected to perform exactly the same movement(s), presented for the First Round, in the Final at St Cuthbert's Church, 5 Lothian Road, EH1 2EP, on Sunday 15 March 2026, accompanied by the Friends of the Festival Orchestra. This performance should not exceed 20 minutes.
- Finalists will be responsible for sourcing and paying for the hiring of orchestral parts, including a conductor's score. Please note that IMSLP parts are not acceptable.
- By entering this class, you confirm that you have read and agree to abide by the Festival Regulations in the 2026 Syllabus. You also consent to being photographed by an ECFA-approved photographer and to any photographs being used in Festival publicity.

SUSAN CLARK (Piano) attended the Trinity College of Music Junior Department, continued her studies at Cambridge and successfully completed a Post-graduate Diploma in performance at the Royal College of Music. She has appeared at many major London concert venues and throughout the country as a soloist and accompanist. Susan teaches at Merchant Taylor's School, Latymer Upper School and the Royal Masonic School for Girls. She has played for masterclasses throughout the country and has accompanied courses at Canford Summer School, Ripon Operatic Summer School and Stratford Flute Festival. She examines for the Associated Board in the UK and internationally and is an adjudicator for The British and International Federation of Festivals. Susan has published articles on teaching techniques in the Music Teacher magazine and published her own music theory book to help students prepare for their grade 5 theory exams.

PAUL HARRIS (Woodwind, Chamber Music) is one of the UK's most influential music educationalists. He studied the clarinet at the Royal Academy of Music, where he won the August Manns Prize for outstanding performance in clarinet playing, and where he now teaches. He is in great demand as a teacher, composer and writer, having published over 600 books. His inspirational master classes and workshops continue to influence thousands of young musicians and teachers all over the world in both the principles and practice of musical performance and education.

NADIA HINSON (Piano) graduated from the Royal Academy of Music having studied the violin with Manoug Parikian and the piano with Jean Harvey. She began her career as a freelance violinist playing in many London based orchestras. As an accompanist to singers and instrumentalists, she met her musician husband Nigel and together they founded the Veloce Ensemble. Nadia has been a senior consultant for the LEAD Academy trust, involved in developing music in Nottinghamshire schools, and leading workshops to encourage as many youngsters as possible to experience music and the arts in large scale productions. She has also set up composition workshops to inspire children to explore feelings and ideas through music. Nadia is an International examiner for the ABRSM, a Jazz examiner for the ABRSM, an adjudicator for the British and International Federation of Festivals, and a member of the Royal Society of Musicians. In 2025, Nadia became an Associate of The Royal Academy of Music (ARAM) for her significant contribution and services to music education.

GAYNOR KEEBLE (Choirs & Vocal) gained scholarships to the University of Warwick and the Royal Academy of Music. She has combined a busy performing career with teaching both privately and at Warwick, as well as being a Federation festival adjudicator. She is also an external assessor at both the Royal Northern College of Music and Birmingham Conservatoire. Passionate about music education, she also works closely with D'Oyly Carte Opera Trust, delivering workshops on Gilbert and Sullivan to universities and conservatoires. She has performed solo roles with all the major national opera companies, including over 85 appearances at the Royal Ballet and Opera House. Gaynor also maintains a busy concert career including performances of Elgar's Musicmakers and Dream of Gerontius.

MURRAY MCLACHLAN (Concerto First Round) is Professor of Piano at the Royal Northern College of Music, visiting Professor of Piano at the University of St. Andrews and, since 1997, Head of Keyboard at Chetham's School of Music in Manchester. He has taught many musicians who have gone on to have successful careers in music, winning

prizes and performing internationally. In 2001 he founded the world famous Chetham's International Summer School and Festival for Pianists, now in its 24th season. His recording career began in 1988 and includes over fifty releases. Of special Scottish interest is the complete solo piano music of Erik Chisholm as well as releases of Ronald Stevenson, John McLeod, Ronald Center, and Marcus Blunt. He writes a column for International Piano magazine, now in its 22nd year and his three books on technique have received wide acclaim. Recently appointed Patron of EPTA UK, having been chair from 2007-2021, he has also been patron of the Aberdeen Youth Orchestra and is currently Vice President of the Northeast of Scotland Music School. He was awarded a knighthood by the Order of St John for services to Maltese Music, and in 2013 the University of Dundee awarded Murray an honorary doctorate for services to music and education.

ALLAN NEAVE (Guitars) studied at the RSAMD (1984) and the RNCM (1988) and since then has been performing worldwide. He is a regular guest at many of the world's leading musical events and has worked with many influential musicians. Career highlights have included recording Gordon McPherson's concerto 'Born of Funk and Fear of Failing' with new music group, Psappha; performing Scottish Guitar Music in Peru; a tour of Australia with virtuoso flautist Alison Mitchell; a tour of the far east with Tetra Guitar quartet; performances of Rodrigo's 'Concierto de Aranjuez' with the RSNO; and recording the soundtrack for a film documentary about the great Scottish painter, John Bellany. Allan has been Artistic Director of the Dundee International Guitar Festival since its inception and in 2000 he received the Scotland on Sunday Glenfiddich ® Spirit of Scotland Award for Music.

JENA CHUN-WAH PANG (Concerto Final) was awarded an instrumental scholarship to study Music at St Peter's College, Oxford and studied the violin with Lydia Mordkovitch and the piano with Lora Dimitrova. For the last 32 years he has been in high demand internationally as a teacher, judging competitions and scholarships. His students are first prize-winners of several international piano and string competitions, and the EPTA UK competition. He was also a solicitor and partner in a law firm for 10 years. He has given concerts, lessons, lectures and masterclasses internationally, appeared on both British and Hong Kong television and concertised with Dennis Lee, Chee Hung Toh and Graeme Humphrey. Jena is Piano Convenor and a trustee of the Southend Festival of Performing Arts, trustee of the Freda Parry Scholarship Fund Competition, on the juries of several international piano and strings competitions and adjudicator for the British and International Federation of Festivals for Music, Dance and Speech.

ROY ROBINSON (Concerto First Round) was a major prize-winning viola pupil of Frederick Riddle while at the Royal College of Music, and a dual first study pupil of Angus Morrison. He holds a complete suite of performing and teaching diplomas on piano and viola and an MA in music. He also has a background as an organist and vast experience as a choir trainer and conductor. He has taught academic music to A Level, the piano, violin and viola to diploma level, and the violin to RAM Exhibitioners. Roy has organised and coached orchestral and singing courses and festivals for children, and has coached and conducted adult choral societies. His extensive experience as a performer has included playing viola and piano in orchestra and ensembles and as a solo recitalist. A busy ABRSM grade, diploma and jazz examiner, he has worked all over the world. As a longstanding adjudicator member of the British, Federation of Music Festivals, Roy brings wide experience of performing and teaching.

IAIN SANDILANDS (Percussion) has performed and recorded extensively with an array of major orchestras and ensembles. He received his first pair of drumsticks as a Christmas gift when he was 3 years old and has enjoyed hitting pots and pans ever since! His musical life has been filled with variety - from playing in rural village halls to full

stadiums. Iain has played percussion on more than 30 albums and numerous broadcasts for TV and radio with bands, orchestras and some of Scotland's best-loved singers. In addition to tutoring at Big Noise Raploch, he teaches at Play On, Paragon's award-winning music programme for young people with additional needs.

HILARY STURT (Concerto Final) studied the violin with Shiela Nelson, David Takeno, and Felix Andrievsky, graduating from the Guildhall School of Music and the Royal College of Music with solo, chamber and contemporary music prizes. As a violinist and violist she has performed worldwide with Ensemble Modern for 20 years, including notable projects with Frank Zappa, Peter Eotvos and Pierre Boulez. She has been guest leader of many British ensembles and chamber orchestras, a member of the Rasumovsky Quartet and Apartment House, winners of the Philharmonic Society Award for the Most Outstanding Chamber Music in 2011. Much in demand as a teacher, adjudicator, and conductor, Hilary is Head of Strings at St Paul's Girls' School, Head of Chamber Music at the Junior Department of the RCM, Instrumental Teaching Tutor at the Senior RCM, a Diploma examiner for the Associated Board and an examiner for AQA exam board. Recently, she was awarded an MA from the Institute of Education. A delightfully misbehaved rescue dog and her husband's home- made bread keep her grounded.

KAY TUCKER (Strings, Chamber Music) was born in Sheffield and began studying the cello at the age of 12, continuing on to the Guildhall School of Music and Drama. Her career has combined teaching and adjudicating with performing as a soloist, chamber musician and orchestral player. Kay has been in popular demand as an Adjudicator and has worked at over 200 festivals, including the National Festival of Music for Youth. Kay's passion for teaching led her to develop an early years strings and general musicianship system known as 'Stringbabies'. Since its inception in 2004, 'Stringbabies' has become accepted as a leading approach in strings teaching and is being delivered throughout the UK and abroad. In 2014 Kay was a finalist in the BBC Community Heroes Awards in Education for her work in developing 'Stringbabies'. More recently Kay has worked as a consultant to Trinity Guildhall, selecting repertoire for graded exams and diplomas.

HEATHER YULE (Harps, Traditional) first studied the traditional Scottish harp with Savourna Stevenson and Isobel Mieras. She then began the classical harp, initially with Sanchia Pielou in Glasgow, and then over the years studied with eminent harp tutors such as Eira Lynn Jones, Elunid Pierce and the American harpist Gail Barber. In 1994 she gained a BMus in pedal harp performance. Since university Heather has concentrated on teaching and performing on the Scottish harp. She has taught and led workshops privately and at schools, festivals such as the Edinburgh International Harp Festival, feisean and harp courses throughout the UK and abroad. Heather has been a frequent adjudicator at both the National Mod and various local Mods and Festivals. She is one of the specialist examiners for the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland.
